For the first part of this year's summer assignment, read George Orwell's novel *1984* and answer all the questions in the corresponding study guide, found below. Your responses should be handwritten, and in complete sentences. Most responses will need no more than a sentence or two.

Bring your completed study guide, along with your physical copy of the novel—ebooks, audiobooks or any other virtual versions are not allowed—to the first day of classes. At that time, you'll be given the *second* part of the summer assignment: an in-class essay on the novel.

The study guide is separated into three sections, just as the novel is. My suggestion is to read a chapter, then answer the corresponding questions, then continue going back and forth in that pattern. The novel is dense, and reading too much of it at one time may make it difficult to maintain understanding.
